EXHIBITIONS

The abundance and diversity of performance hi:stories in various regions of Switzerland has not only been recorded in Maps but has also led to interviews with performance artists. An open invitation was then sent out. Previously unobtainable documentation on the output of Swiss artists has been uploaded onto the BANB BANG project platform. These documents, interwoven to Video Ensembles, feed into a Panorama with Viewing Stations and frame three temporary exhibitions. Seven Themes connect audience, performance and museum and inspire weekends with live performances, talks and discussions. Presentations and productions - on site and outside in the Solitude Park - are starting points for shared perception and lingering.



AKTIONSHALLE (ACTIVITY HALL)

In the Activity Hall live performances, lectures, discussions and projections are taking place. (see PROGRAMME)

1 Thematic Clouds — The drawings on the high walls refer to seven themes and questions around performance art.

2 Maps — At first, BANG BANG called for research meetings where the respective protagonists of local performance art scenes could gather. Their memories were directly noted on large mind maps leading up to these large overview drawings shown here. On Wednesday, 27 July from 11 am until 1 pm, a research meeting referring to performance events in Ticino will take place.

3 Video Ensembles — Three curated video ensembles on nine monitors each display interviews, videos and photos resulting from the open call BANG BANG launched throughout Switzerland.

Setting – The wall frieze shows the names of those who have participated in the collection process or who are showing their work. For the live events, the specially designed furniture allows for a flexible setting. A central projection is dedicated to various video programmes and lectures.

EXHIBITION SPACE

Temporary Exhibitions — Three different artistic practices are presented here, one each month. With a retrospective look on their work and in link with their networks, they play with the structure and format of a performance exhibit itself.

PANORAMA

The panorama proposes insights in individual or collective researchs. Documents on performance art are on display on various tables, screens and in show-cases.

• Viewing Stations – Responding to an Open Call, numerous artists have been uploading documents on performance art since November 2021. This collection of documents can be viewed here in its entirety and in full length. They form the foundation of the whole exhibition.

Study Room — Here, research, reflection and production of texts can be undertaken in close proximity to the live events. On Friday, 8 July starting at 11 am a Wikipedia writing workshop is being held here. Based on the documents contained in the Panorama, on the exhibitions, on the performances and the maps, information referring to performance art will be transferred into the digital encyclopedia. 8 Studio – Individual video or audio pieces can be seen and heard in the studio. It is also a place for photo shootings and live interviews. (see PROGRAMME)

9 Poster — Research projects on performance art as well as institutional and artistic approaches to the documentation of performance art are presented in a series of posters.

PAVILION IN THE PARK

The theme of hospitality will be explored in the Solitude Park in front of the museum building. From 9 July until 7 August, PANCH – the Performance Art Network CH addresses the issue of «Social Elegance» and creates opportunities for participatory formats, like the Open Call «Come and Show» on Saturday, 6 August from 11 am until 9 pm.

The Pavilion in the Park offers an ideal environment for cultivating friendships and expanding networks. Here you can linger, share and exchange ideas – also outside the opening hours of the museum.

7 THEMES

1 — SAGA (looking back)

Although performance art is a relatively new medium we can already look back on many stories. How does this heritage become productive? It's about stories of beginnings and playing with various possibilities of recording collective memories. It's about traditions of Oral History as narrative and counter-narrative. Current performance art is also shaped by reception and research.

2 — EMANCIPATION FROM THE MEDIUM (aesthetic practices, hybridisation)

Performance art has become an independent art genre which develops its strength in the in-between. Venues with their disciplinary conditions and traditions of reception are continually resonating and inscribing themselves into the artistic creations. Among these places, the difference of working conditions are considerable. Performance art originates and takes its inspiration from subcultures and diverse artistic and social political discourses.

3 — ON THE RADICAL EQUIVALENCE OF EXPERIENCE (queer, choreopolitics)

The question is: from where do we say I ? From where do we say We ? How can we connect space and time and keep their interchange flexible? Performance art is sensitising us regarding the way places and contexts do or do not enable experiences, as settings of space and mind. Choreopolitics investigates how body and feelings are shaped by invisible hands.

4 — THE FLEETING ACT (politics, activism, feminism)

The dynamic relationship between subject and collective and the wish for self-empowerment is common to the artist and the political activist. Through unexpected means and unprecedented actions, performance art questions social, cultural or political systems. Performance art can create new ways of relating to the world, can irritate up to the point of creating facts and influencing the course of events.

5 — SOCIAL ELEGANCE (friendships, scenes, networks)

Exchange of ideas, pooling of skills, team building: what is missing on site is organised independently for each project. The performance artists tend to take on all functions of putting-art-into-the-world, from programming to publicity, from administration to documentation and archiving, from setting up to cleaning and being a host. Mutual invitations are common, whether translocal or transcontinental. Under the sign of friendship and collaborative work, is not performance art de facto an art of being together, of the collective and the interaction?

6 — LIVE TRANSMISSION (situation, reception)

No performance art without context. Performance is situational and direct. How does the future of reception of ephemeral art look like ? Audience and performers share the same time and the same space, which is charged and transposed by the breathing, animate presence of all those occupying it. This co-presence assigns the audience a special role: To what extent is its gaze of constitutive importance to the work being watched? This initial set-up of transmission and identification then spawns translations, communications, and responses of all kinds. Sharing and talking about what was shown will henceforth be crucial to its continued existence.

7 — FRECKLY NIGHT

(dazzling moments between past and future)

Which great moments, which undiscovered heroes and heroines, which steadfast collectives are to be summoned? And how strung together? This festive moment celebrates the exhibition itself and the insights gained from it, as well as the togetherness of concert, performance, and show. «Must or not»: The dos and don'ts of the craft will themselves supply the inspiration for an evening of moderated performance art, full of sensuality, energy, humour, and collectivity. And how do energies keep flowing again and again? These questions are discussed by a cross mapping of feminist projects.
